Off-Site Learning Experience #1 - North Gorge Trail Walk, Alex Buhmeyer - 0.20 CEU

Lets go for a hike! On-site tour participants will get a hiking tour of the first segment of the North Gorge Trail System. We be discussing trail construction principles and how to make a sustainable trail network. Throughout the tour we will explore various elements of singletrack trail including control points, TTFs (technical trail features) bridge construction, berms, rollers, jumps, and switchbacks. We will also be discussing trail amenities including parking, informational kiosks, and signage. This is a 1.5 mile hike in moderate terrain so please bring appropriate footwear and water.

This session will provide information on the construction delivery methods currently available to public entities and discuss the merits of engaging a construction manager for a better outcome on future projects. We will discuss in detail the construction manager's involvement during the design phases and construction phase and the benefits the public entity should expect from this arrangement.

Session #5 - The Iowa DNRs Community Fishing Program: Considerations for Urban Pond Renovations, *Tyler Stubbs - 0.10 CEU* (Location: Catfish Hall Room B2)

To address lowa's increasing urban population; the lowa DNR developed a Community Fishing Program to focus on fishing opportunities in lowa's larger and more diverse cities. Many of the fishing opportunities that exist within city limits around the state are within stormwater retention basins within city parks and green spaces. When these locations are no longer meeting their stormwater goals due to sedimentation a complete renovation (draining) may be required. If a fish population is present, this adds an additional layer of environmental and public relations variables to the project. Learn how the DNR's Community Fishing Program and city governments can work together to help urban pond renovation projects be successful through strategic planning and communication.

Session #13 - Get Kids Moving Again: Connected Playgrounds & Games, Matt Toner - 0.10 CEU (Location: Catfish Hall Room A)

Children today spend less and less time outdoors engaging in healthy physical activity, compared to just a few years ago, and more and more time indoors, sedentary, and exposed to a number of screens: cell phones, iPods, tablets, computers, and televisions. The negative health consequences of these habits are already evident, and will likely worsen over time. But while many parents might perceive screen-technology as an obstacle to improving their child's fitness, recent studies have shown that a new generation of mobile games can actually be a very effective tool at motivating higher physical activity amongst kids while also increasing parental engagement. They use the appeal of mobile games and apps to encourage children ages 3 to 9 (dubbed "touchscreen natives") out to the playground, along with a parent who holds the device. At the connected playground, movement, activities and goals earn the children their sought after rewards of badges, avatars, etc. Not only are the parents and children engaged in play, but also the aggregate data collected (exceeding online safety and privacy guidelines for children) helps inform landscape architects, playground designers, planners, multi-family housing owners, funders, and municipalities about what equipment is used, how it is used, and when it is used. This data can lead to the funding, design, and construction of highly utilized, highly effective playgrounds, as well as creating parent/child time and a healthier younger generation. To enhance and encourage investments in future connected playgrounds, the data has the ability to track the ROI of playground expenditures.
