PARKING TECHNOLOGY



OVERVIEW OF THE NEW SYSTEM

Replacing the 3,000 individual parking meters are Stall Marker IDs with unique 6-digit numbers. Use these space numbers at a kiosk, mobile app or text to park to pay for parking.



HOW DO THE STALL MARKERS WORK?

Each stall marker will have a unique 6-digit space number associated with each parking space. This number is necessary to remember to pay for parking at the kiosks and on the mobile app. Remember your space number to pay for your parking.



HOW DO THE KIOSKS WORK?

The kiosks have on-screen instructions to walk you through the process. Make sure to have your unique 6-digit number to pay for parking. You can make a payment at any kiosk location, not just the kiosk on the block where you parked.



HOW DOES THE MOBILE APP WORK?

The mobile app, ParkDSM, shows all available parking downtown. Once parked, you can enter your space number, a debit/credit card, and pay for parking from your phone. You can extend your parking anytime through



ADDITIONAL INFORMATION & WAYS TO PAY

Time limits on parking are not changing. Your session will only last as long as the limit (4 or 12 hours.) You can text "PARK" to 77223, or if you do not have a smartphone, you can call 833-930-0050 for your parking session. The kiosks function in three languages; English, French and Spanish. ParkDSM is available in English and Spanish.


